Dr. Dennis Harold O'Brien, Waco native and history professor at West Virginia University in West Virginia, died Friday hospital in Morgantown, V W.Va. He was 50.

Dr. O'Brien was born Aug. 14, 1942, in Waco. He received a doctorate in history from the Unversity of Illinois at Chicago. He also studied at Harvard University

and the Sorbonne in Paris.

Dr. O'Brien taught French his-tory at WVU for 23 years and was a noted authority on 17th century France. He also taught Revolutionary Europe and Western Civilization and developed courses on the history of European women. Dr. O'Brien also worked many summers with the Governor Honors Academy for high school

John Maxwell, an associate professor and director of WVU's undergraduate program in history, said "Dr. O'Brien was an outstanding teacher in all senses. He recognized that students need to be challenged. . . . He truly did

O'Brien's talent in the classroom earned him many teaching awards, including the WVU Foundation Award of Out-

standing Teaching.

He was a member of the National Organization for Women.
