I completed the requirements for Eagle in 1958 (with substantially less than the 72 merit badges you earned). At that time, I was a member of Explorer Post 24, wearing this shirt, which I wanted to wear today, but it has shrunk considerably over the years. So, this Eagle badge I hold in my hand is 67 years old. I'd like to pass it on to you, and perhaps one day you will have a son or grandson who continues our tradition."

David reported that his "3-generation presentation almost brought several folks to tears. Just think, if Jake passes it on to his grandson, it could be 125 years old."

What a wonderful idea to pass along that tradition! Congratulations to all who have earned the Eagle Scout Award. It is a great accomplishment that requires a lot of determination.

MEDICAL CORNER:

Have you ever been bitten or scratched by a cat? - Jeanne Holland Harman

"Not ever having had a cat nor having been around one, I know nothing about cats. In fact, I have always been afraid of them. However, new neighbors moved in behind me who have a beautiful Tuxedo cat named BOOTS. Boots has really taken a liking to my yard....and to me. Every time I go in the back yard—here he is in a flash! I guess he thinks I am playing with the leaves or whatever. He likes to play with the rake, hoe, or whatever tool I might be using. He is just a most curious cat, always loving on me, wrapping in and around my legs, even jumping up in my lap wanting attention. However, after Boots bit me I quickly learned a few things:

- 1. A cat can be fickle, very quickly! Its mood can quickly change for reasons that only the cat knows, and it can scratch or bite you all the while he is "loving on you" making you think he wants your love in return.
- 2. Cats have sharp teeth and nails that can puncture deeply. In my research, everything I read said to contact a doctor immediately after being bitten by a cat, especially if it is a stray cat. A stray cat can carry rabies so a doctor should be seen within 8 hours. If you know the owners of the cat, you might want to get the cat's shot history. I did not call a doctor as I knew Boots had recently had his shots.
- 3. The first thing to do for the bite is flush out the wound for about 5 minutes. Then sterilize and briefly bandage it. However, a cat's bite will heal quicker if left open and exposed to air. Keep the wound clean and continue to use an antibiotic cream. I also used an Epsom salts-vinegar-warm water soak that really seemed to help.
- 4. The important thing is to act quickly after a cat bite and be alert to any signs of infection. Use your own discretion about a doctor's visit.

This was just my experience with a cat bite. Cat owners can probably enlighten us with better ways to care for a bite/scratch. But a few things I now know: Boots did not love me nearly as much as I thought he did, I was lucky that my bite did not become infected, and I am most dubious about being friends with Boots although he is a beautiful cat with a very outgoing personality.









1. Howard Dudgeon on interesting things at Baylor:
